Updates from Sally Nissen, Head of Nursing and Healthcare

Treloar's students require nearly 300,000 doses of prescribed medicines and feed each year. As such, we have stringent processes to help ensure students receive their medicines correctly. The nursing team have asked me to provide a reminder to help you understand what we need from you in preparation for the new term.



Medicines from home

If sending medicines from home, where possible, please send them in unopened packaging, with a legible prescription label, and with a note to show when it was opened (if liquid or cream).

Please check the expiry date before sending as we cannot use expired products.

Medicine changes

Sometimes changes to students' medicines are delayed because we do not have the right evidence. Please let the Health Centre know when there is a change to medicine (such as new medicine, or a dose or frequency change for existing medicines). However, it is essential we also have supporting evidence and we accept the following:

- the right-hand side of the repeat prescription
- headed clinic letters
- an email directly from the prescriber/NHS team
- a recent GP medical printout

New medical equipment

If your young person is prescribed a new medical device, or you are anticipating a change (such as a CPAP machine following a sleep study), please highlight this to the Student Progress Co-ordinator as soon as possible. We will then assess the situation, gather information, start training staff and writing care plans. If we are not given sufficient notice, the student's return may be delayed.

And lastly.. know your rights

Under the Equality Act 2010, organisations have a legal duty to make changes in their approach or provision, called reasonable adjustments, to ensure that services are as accessible to people with disabilities as they are for everyone else.

Reasonable adjustments can include:

- giving someone a priority appointment if they find it difficult waiting in their GP surgery or hospital
- offering a longer appointment if someone needs more time with a doctor or nurse to make sure they understand the information they are given
- having a quiet space available for people waiting for their appointment

You can ask for the adjustments needed to be flagged on your young person's medical record.

Dear parents and carers,

To help safeguard all children and young people, we need to make sure we know who is on site. Like all schools and colleges, all visitors are asked to sign in at Reception to ensure the following:

- That only approved people have access to the school and college
- To make sure that support is available for all visitors
- So that we know who is on site should there be a fire or other emergency event
- To support students developing their independence to have free access to and through the Jowett Centre.



In answer to some recent queries, parents, carers and transport teams may come into the building during drop-off and arrival times to use the toilet. All visitors will be required to sign in at Jowett Centre reception. Visitors on site will be escorted at all times by Treloar's staff. We also kindly ask that if you are in classrooms and walking around the corridors that you do not use your mobile.

These measures collectively enhance the overall safety, efficiency, and security for our school community.

Occupational Therapy Week

In early November, we highlighted the importance of occupational therapy by celebrating OT Week 2024.

Every day, occupational therapists across the UK make seemingly small changes that have a big impact on the lives of the people they support and the profession. The Royal College of Occupational Therapists's (RCOT) campaign 'Small Change, Big Impact' celebrates these small changes

and champions the powerful impact achieved.

At Treloar's, the OT Team has been sharing some of their examples with each other—these have included:

- placing black vinyl over a desk to enable a student with a visual impairment to see items more clearly
- attaching sensory and fidget toys to a loop on a student's tray to stop them throwing these items onto the floor and out of reach. This has enabled the student to play and entertain themselves more independently
- placing raised coloured stickers onto a hoist controller so the student is able to operate the controller themselves. This means that the student now only needs one person to assist them with care which has enabled them to feel more independent and less reliant on others

Being Student Support Assistant

"My main purpose as a Lead Student Support Assistant is to support our wonderful students—whether it's with accessing their education or with their care needs. I act as a facilitator, get involved in the therapeutic side of the students' timetable as well as their education: maths, English, science and all of the usual

subjects that you would expect at school. We provide support with maneuvering our students into different positions and providing different experiences throughout the day, caring for them (providing personal care if needed) and helping them with their eating and drinking needs. So a bit of everything—it's a very varied role. We are very lucky—we've also been on some lovely school trips, including regular power boat trips with Wet Wheels, visiting Riding for the Disabled stables and visits to local places like churches and shops where students learn new life skills."

Campaigning against floating bus stops

Invited by Surrey Coalition of Disabled People, Dan went on a trip to London to raise awareness of the issues around floating bus stops and their impact on blind, visually impaired, disabled, older and vulnerable bus passengers.

Dan said, "I went to No 10 to take a petition. I was excited. I went on the bus. I got to see the Houses of Parliament. I like politics. I want to help."

What are floating bus stops?

Surrey Coalition said: "What are floating bus stops? It's a bus stop which has a carriageway or a cycle track running behind it so that people board or alight a bus from what is essentially either a large traffic island or perhaps something which looks like central reserve. Why are we campaigning against them? Blind, visually impaired, disabled, older and vulnerable bus passengers should be able to get on and off the bus independently directly from the pavement as they have always done."

Practising driving skills with festive Drivedecks

Treloar's students have embraced the festive spirit this Christmas by practising their driving skills using one of our Drivedecks decorated as a sleigh.

The Drive Deck, or driving platform as it is sometimes called, is used across Treloar's site, supporting students of all ages. It helps learners develop crucial skills that transfer to various learning and recreational activities.

The Drivedeck aids students in mastering the use of switches and building the confidence necessary for mobility. It's an invaluable assessment tool for our Occupational Therapists, who can use them to establish a baseline and create a personalised progression plan for each student.

The Drivedecks can be set up to meet students' individual needs and requirements. Some students may practice their driving skills using the tracking system installed around the site, which ensures they can navigate safely while reinforcing the concept of cause and effect. Other students may be using the auditory/visual scanner so that they can choose which direction they want to go and practise free driving and there are many other options in-between. Our students can trial different access methods to find the one that suits them best, for example, a head

or foot operated switch. Others may use a joystick with a bespoke made 'topper' made in-house by our Assistive Technology Department.

A recent addition to our range of access options is an Ability Drive which allows a student who uses eye-gaze technology to drive independently. We are now lucky enough to have a fleet of 3 Drivedecks which means those students who benefit from regular practice have access to using them as required.

Huge thanks to The Carmen Benevolent Trust and the Worshipful Company of Wheelwrights who both helped fund the Drivedecks.



New Immersive Learning Room in use

Our new Immersive Zone has been incredibly popular with classes from both Treloar School and College. Thanks to interactive projections on the walls and floor, accompanied by scents, students have been transported to various environments, including under the sea, rainforests, deserts, Santa's grotto and a winter wonderland.

This new space, featuring augmented and virtual reality, enables students to explore curriculum topics and lessons. This December, all classes have been enjoying winter-themed sessions.

In the coming months, students will participate in sessions designed to safely prepare them for real-world scenarios they may not have yet had the opportunity to explore.

The new Immersive Zone is part of our amazing new Bradbury Learning Centre, funded by charitable trusts, individuals, and the East Hampshire District Council.

Thanks to a specially adapted keyboard, Freya was able to help with administration tasks and particularly enjoyed entering data. She said afterwards: "I loved working at the Cardiac Rehab Centre. My favourite thing was working on the computer."

As a result of these sessions, Freya has developed her work skills further and also her communication skills, particularly with people unfamiliar to her. In addition, not only did she thoroughly enjoy her work placement but she also demonstrated an ability to follow instructions accurately with moderate support.

EHDC Councillors visit Treloar's

In November, East Hampshire District Councillors Adeel Shah and Graham Hill visited the newly created Bradbury Learning Centre with Hannah Robbins from EHDC Community Development Team. They were invited to explore the new Immersive Learning Zone and to try out a Neater Eater in Treloar's Occupational Therapy training kitchen.

East Hampshire District Council have generously contributed £7,272 towards the creation of the Bradbury Learning Centre through the EHDC Supporting Communities Fund. Cllr Graham Hill has been a long-term supporter of Treloar's, most recently using his £1000 Councillor Community Grant to help fund a Neater Eater for the Occupational Therapy training kitchen.

Their visit included a tour round the four new learning zones of the Bradbury Learning Centre, including the newly installed Immersive Learning Zone, the library area, the technology zone



Rivermead Gardens residents reflect on their first year

In November, we reached the first-year anniversary of the opening of 4 specially adapted flats in the Rivermead Gardens development in Alton. The flats were specially designed with complex disability in mind, providing physically disabled young adults with affordable, fully accessible accommodation in the heart of the community.

A year on, we caught up with the first residents to find out how they're getting on in their new homes. We asked Zoe about the benefits of living in Rivermead Gardens:

"I am still in an area I am familiar with. I can still use same doctors, dentists, hairdressers, I'm still under Basingstoke wheelchair services, so I don't have to start any of the services again. I can still use the gym and swimming pool that I know. I am with other disabled residents. I am now in my forever home which is suitable for my needs."



The flats include 2 carer studios on the floor directly above them. These studios allow for live-in carers, should they be required by the residents.

For Zoe, this means she has 24-hour care so she can "do what she wants, when she wants to."

"I found it strange to begin with that I didn't need to book care but now I wouldn't change it."

One of the first residents to move in was Kane, who met East Hampshire MP, Rt Hon Damian Hinds for the ribbon cutting ceremony. Kane's mother Kerry said:

"The community is great and access to the town is wheelchair friendly. Kane has been involved with events linked to the local bookshop in Alton."

Treloar's purchased the flats using a Section 106 agreement as part of the affordable housing quota for the wider Rivermead Gardens development. This followed significant work undertaken by Treloar's with East Hampshire District Council and the property developers to influence development and planning and open up more opportunities for accessible affordable homes in the future.
