Welcome from the Head of School

Dear parents and carers,

Another busy term to start 2025! This half term has been a hive of activity with a host of special visitors including Her Royal Highness The Duchess of Edinburgh and the Lord Mayor of the City of London, our visitors wanted to come and experience what life is like for students. Our students were able to respond to a range of questions about their daily routines and what they are learning.



Whilst not as famous or as Royal, we were proud

to invite teachers from around Alton to join a twilight session hosted by our PE team to explore how accessible we make our PE sessions. Staff from visiting school gained an insight into alternative games and simple adaptations to equipment to return to their schools with. Plans are in the making for some further competition between schools.

Our primary students wrote to their peers at Andrews Endowed (primary school next door to us) with an invitation to become pen pals. This was accepted and our students were so happy with their replies. This was followed up with a playdate at Treloar's where the pen pals could meet.

As you will see from our date list, we have a number of events coming up after half term. Student leaders have captured student voice through their proposals for how to explore both World Book Day and Pi Day (Maths day) next half term. 


Re-assessment of needs

We are committed to keeping students safe and supporting their prompt return to education following any absence.

With the ongoing NHS pressures, the Senior Management Team has reviewed our policy on when a re-assessment is needed, and taken advice from our local NHS consultants.

Since the education, therapy and care we provide is based on the initial assessment of a young person's needs, we need to know if





- A need for an assessment in hospital or urgent care centre (even if not as an inpatient)
- · An admission to hospital e.g., for illness or surgery
- Absence due to illness lasting more than 7 days

In these cases, we will need to re-assess your young person. This will be arranged as a priority at your convenience, and may range from a simple phone call to an onsite MDT assessment. We are unable to accept a returning student unless this process has been followed; please be assured we agree the vast majority of students to return straight after the reassessment.

Sending intimate photos of students to Treloar's

If you feel there is a need to share images with us, please speak to a senior nurse in the Health Centre before sending any image. We want to ensure that we maintain confidentiality and dignity, so will advise on whether a photo is needed. In most cases a verbal or written description will be sufficient.

Within this, we are mindful of the law which states the taking, making, sharing and possessing indecent images and pseudo-photographs of people under 18 is illegal - while the same can also be true for adults in some situations. Indecent photos can include images of naked or partially naked children. At Treloar's we take extra care when handling



images and will promptly seek safeguarding advice if we are concerned an image might be 'indecent'.

While there might be a good clinical reason for you sharing a photo with us (such as alerting us to a pressure sore or infection in an intimate area) we ask that you talk to us first on the Health Centre number: 01420 547450

This will hopefully also help us reinforce safeguarding messages to students about use of their own images.

Safer Internet Day

Over the last 2 weeks before the half term, Treloar's joined other schools nationwide to celebrate Safer Internet Day 2025: the largest global online safety campaign.

This year's theme, 'Too good to be true? Protecting yourself and others from scams online,' focuses on teaching children and young people how to identify and avoid scams, and highlights available support.

Scams can take many forms and target anyone, including young people. You may think that your child would be able to spot an online scammer, but the truth is that they are incredibly convincing and hard to spot. They often involve fake profiles and identities to target people. You may have heard this referred to as 'catfishing.' If your child has been targeted by a scam online and they have been made to do something that they didn't want to, then they are not to blame, they are not in trouble, and support is available.

One particular piece of advice from NSPCC is once your child has a phone to contact the service provider to make sure it is registered as a child's device. Children's Mental Health Week: 3-9 February 2025

How Treloar's Counselling Team supports children and young people across school and college

Treloar's mental health team is made up of Counsellors, an Art Therapist, Music Therapists and Play Therapists, who all use their expert knowledge and skills in a non-judgmental way to provide evidence-based psychological interventions. We also have a family therapist.

Sessions can help students deal with particular feelings and experiences causing them problems and disrupt their learning. Structured sessions also support emotions the student doesn't know they have, which can also alleviate the physical effects of stress.

Professional Training

All of our team have specialist training within their field to at least degree level and are constantly striving to improve their way of working and complete further training. Vanessa Edworthy, Head of the team, is currently completing the final year of her master's course, in Play Therapy, Cognitive behavioural therapy (CBT) and also Systemic Therapy, where her dissertation will be focussed on working with clients who have a disability. Cress Lindsay, Specialist Music Therapist, is currently undertaking her PhD at Guildhall



University. Jude Horwell is in the process of training her young dog, Stanley, to be a Canine Assisted Therapy Dog—in working therapeutically with disabled children.

Wizards in training

Building on last term's theme, "Lights, Camera, Action," primary classes will explore how the understanding of light, shadows, and the states of matter can create enchanting special effects for this term's new topic "Wizards in training".

Magical potions and spells with states of matter

In the wizard training, students will experiment with solids, liquids, and gases to create magical potions and spells and discover how different states of matter can be combined to produce bubbling brews, smoky elixirs, and sparkling concoctions.

This hands-on experience will not only be fun, but it will be also educational, as students will be learning about the properties and transformations of matter.

Understanding money and transactions

Why do we need money, and how do we use it? This term, primary classes will explore the concept of money, its importance in our daily lives and how transactions work. From simple exchanges to complex financial systems, students will uncover the role of money in society and learn practical skills for managing it, including a visit to a local supermarket.

The importance of hygiene

Hygiene is crucial for maintaining good health. Classes will discuss what hygiene is, why it is important, and how they can keep themselves clean. Through interactive activities, everyone will learn about proper handwashing, dental care and other hygiene practices that help prevent illness and promote well-being.

Exploring abstract art and Jackson Pollock

What is abstract art and who is Jackson Pollock? Students will dive into the world of abstract art, exploring its unique characteristics and the creative freedom it offers.

All students will be guided during this magical journey as they combine science, art and practical life skills to create an unforgettable learning experience.





Material world

KS3 students were introduced to their new term topic "Material world" by a carousel of activities representing different elements all linking to the themes they will encounter throughout the spring term.

Building site fun!

Students loved layering bricks, giggling as they explored the texture and carefully scooping and spreading to build their towers. Watching Ollie the electronic Sphero roll and bulldoze the rubble was fun for all.

All classes took pleasure in listening to the sander, enjoying the buzzing sound it made. Using switches, a lot of students matched machine sounds to their equipment, engaging their curiosity and senses. From stacking bricks to clearing rubble with magnets, the hands-on activities created a fun and memorable building adventure for everyone!

"Who lives in a house like this?"

To immerse students with the language needed to succeed with this task, groups took part in a variety of creative activities.

The students were encouraged to watch a short video to introduce them to the concept of homes being made from different materials and why this might be? This leads on from the previous topic about eco systems. Students explored a range of safety equipment (e.g.: hard hat, hi-vis jacket etc.), and tools; drills, saws and hammers. Attempts to build the tallest tower and then knocking it down was a very popular task!

Students were encouraged to apply their material knowledge through designing a house for a human or animal as part of the task 'Who lives in a house like this?'. They were tasked to think about homes more broadly, e.g.: choosing what materials they wanted to use for their designs. It was great to see the students working together to problem solve and develop their designs by creating a stronger base so the model was sturdier.



The Rt Hon the Lord Mayor's annual visit to Treloar's





Meet Percy, Healthcare Support Worker

After seeing an online recruitment advert from Treloar's, Percy decided to learn more about what we do and it wasn't long until she decided to apply for a Healthcare Support Worker position.

Today, almost 2 years later, she can't recommend working at Treloar's more. Find out what is special about being a Healthcare Support Worker.

A typical day for a Healthcare Support Worker

"My day starts at the residential house, which is where some of our students live. I help students get up, get ready for college. I also help them with their personal care routines, prepare their meals and help prepare them for college pick-ups.

"The most fun is when I go from the house to the classroom—there I can assist them with different tasks, for example, college assignments. We sometimes go out to do community skills which involve leaving the college and going into the community—this can be going shopping, trips to practice and gain confidence communicating with people outside their usual social circles at Treloar's. And it's quite fun—it's not something I have done before.

"I also support students offsite: a

recent trip I have done was a power boat cruise with Wet Wheels. We also help with offsite activities such as going to a restaurant for lunch: students do the bookings themselves, they choose the restaurants but sometimes students need our assistance so we accompany them during those trips too."

The best parts of being a Healthcare Support Worker

"I think it's all about learning for me. In my role, you really learn every day. Learning every day is a good thing—I want to know more, I want to explore more, I want something more challenging."

Training for Healthcare Support Workers

"We receive a lot of training and I love the medical part of it the most; Training like this allows us to keep students safe—on and off site."
